STANDING RULES FOR THE ASCLS HOUSE OF DELEGATES

- 1. Standing rules for a session of the House of Delegates shall be distributed to the delegates.
- 2. Standing rules of the House of Delegates may be amended by:
 - a. a resolution presented to the house and adopted by a two-thirds vote; or
 - b. a resolution published and distributed prior to the opening of a session of the house and then adopted by a majority vote.
- 3. Any standing rule may be suspended at any time by a two-thirds vote of the House of Delegates.
- 4. All business to come before the House will be set forth at the Annual Meeting of the Board of Directors.
- 5. No new business may be introduced into the House of Delegates unless authorized by a consent of twothirds of the members of the House of Delegates present on the floor or virtually at the time of the vote. If such consent is not obtained, the matter shall be referred without further consideration to the proper standing or special committee.
- 6. Voting for all officers, representatives, and elective positions, including the Nominations Committee, shall take place during the annual meeting week at the time and place designated by the National Program Committee and the chair of the Elections Committee. In the event there are more than two nominees for any one office and a majority vote is not obtained by one candidate on the first ballot, the two candidates receiving the highest votes will be placed on a second ballot, and another time for voting will be arranged and notice thereof posted. Where no provision to resolve a tie vote for elective office is defined in the bylaws, the determination of the successful candidates shall be by lot. In the event there are no contested races for any office a motion to elect the slate by acclamation will be sent to the House by the Board of Directors.
- 7. Unless otherwise defined, whenever a two-thirds vote is required for passage of any proposition, it shall mean the votes cast in favor of that question shall total 2/3 of the votes cast, except that passage of amendments of the Bylaws or an order for revision of the bylaws shall require 2/3 affirmative vote of the accredited members of the House of Delegates, certified as present by the Credentials Committee at the time of the vote on the respective amendment or order for revision.
- 8. When a majority vote is required for passage of the proposition, it shall mean that the vote is more than half of the votes cast.
- 9. In order to be granted the privilege of the floor, a member must stand or raise their hand, address the chair of the house, and give his/her name and constituent society affiliation.
- 10. A member may speak not more than twice and for not more than three (3) minutes each time on the same subject on the same day.

- 11. All motions shall be in writing, signed by the maker, and given to the chair of the house who gives them to the secretary after presentation.
- 12. A summary of the minutes of the previous House of Delegates shall be distributed to all members of the House of Delegates. It shall not be read at a session of the house unless some gross error in duplication necessitates further review.
- 13. Committee reports, which have been published and distributed to the members of the House of Delegates, will not be read. Action to "accept" or "adopt" committee reports is not necessary.
- 14. Roll call or roll call vote shall be taken in alphabetical order of the constituent societies. The chair of each constituent society's delegates will be responsible for the qualifications and number of its delegates, and will report for the delegation at each roll call by reporting the number of voting delegates present, and the votes cast by the delegation.
- 15. Any item presented in the reports of officers, board members, or committee chairs, not requiring action by the House of Delegates, shall be referred (if such is required) without debate to the proper standing or special committee and shall not be further considered by the House of Delegates during the present session.
- All matters requiring the action of the House of Delegates shall be introduced in writing at the Annual Board Meeting in the form of a motion or resolution without a second. Any item of business not presented at this Board meeting, nor introduced herein, must be submitted to the presiding officer no later than 12 hours after the close of the Pre-Annual Board of Directors Meeting for referral to the House of Delegates. The chair will refer the motion/resolution to the House of Delegates.
- 17. The Credentials Committee will give its report as soon as possible following the opening of the meeting, and thereafter whenever there is a request for the number present of accredited members of the House of Delegates.
- 19. The Credentials Committee shall complete certification of all delegations for the number of eligible elections voters. No delegate or alternate may vote in the elections unless they have been certified.
- 20. Past presidents of the society sitting at this House of Delegates may make motions but may not second same.
- 21. Alcoholic beverages in any form are not permitted on the floor of the House of Delegates.

This letter will provide historical and other background information that the Body of Knowledge (BOK) Committee discussed and used in the development of the BOK, 4th edition document.

On January 15, 2022 Malissa Norfolk, Committee Chair BOK 2021-24 presented a BOK Committee proposal to reformat the BOK to make it more congruent with other professions' Body of Knowledge documents at the Mid-year House of Delegates (HOD). A poll of delegates at that meeting favored the proposal and in consultation with and approval of the ASCLS Board of Directors (BOD) a decision was made to adopt a new format.

The goal of the reimagined version of the document is to make it more readable for non-medical laboratory professionals to better understand the role of medical laboratory professionals in health care. Thus, this edition of the BOK is designed to serve as a resource for clinicians, nurses, pharmacists, therapists, patients, caregivers, interprofessional teams, public health officials, and policymakers regarding the wide variety of responsibilities and expected talents of medical laboratory professionals. The new format of the fourth edition of the BOK provides succinct information useful for those involved in hiring, consultation, regulatory compliance, and related activities, such as medical laboratory leaders, human resource managers, government agency officials, and workforce development personnel.

The final working draft of BOK, 4th edition was posted to the OPEN FORUM CONNECT COMMUNITY on March 3, 2025 for review by the ASCLS membership. Comments from five members were returned to BOK Chair by April 4, 2025 deadline. All suggestions were shared with the BOK committee and discussed with individual committee members by email during March. Subsequently, they were discussed by the group during the two working sessions in April committee meetings. Suggested edits and clarifying changes were made when Committee consensus occurred.

Please note that this document is NOT a position paper, but rather a document to be used to advocate for medical laboratory professionals and to educate those outside the profession about the foundational knowledge, technical skills, attributes and behaviors needed in the practice of clinical laboratory medicine.

The document strives to be long-standing, globally applicable and representative of medical laboratory professionals in a wide variety of workplace settings. In line with that goal we have chosen not to list organizations and associations related to clinical laboratory science practice or certifying organization to avoid making the document obsolete as additional certifications and certifying bodies may emerge.

Introduction to the Fourth Edition

A Body of Knowledge (BOK) is a collection of standards, concepts, terms, and tasks that encompasses the specialized expertise of a profession. Unlike the Entry-Level Curriculum (ELC) maintained by the American Society for Clinical Laboratory Science (ASCLS)¹, which outlines what laboratorians should know when entering the profession, the BOK highlights the knowledge and skills of experienced professionals and is widely accepted by practitioners in the field.

The Medical Laboratory Profession

The primary goal of a medical laboratory professional is to **support excellent patient-centered care** by ensuring **accurate**, **precise**, **and timely clinical test results**. According to the **American Society for Clinical Laboratory Science (ASCLS)**: "Quality clinical laboratory testing is evidenced by performing the appropriate laboratory testing for the correct patient at the right time and producing accurate test results, in the most cost-effective manner."²

Achieving this level of quality requires mastering key competencies, including:

- Knowledge of the history and evolution of the profession
- Proficiency in laboratory principles, skills, and techniques
- Application of foundational knowledge in math and science
- Understanding of legal, public policy, and regulatory requirements
- Integration of **global and cultural perspectives** in laboratory practices

History of the Body of Knowledge

The first Body of Knowledge (BOK) was published in 1980 by the American Society for Medical Technology (now ASCLS) to provide the overarching framework for our profession. It served us well for many years. In 1998 and 2004, the BOK was reviewed and updated through the efforts of laboratory professionals, educators, and administrators. The fourth edition now incorporates current practices and adopts a format aligned with those used by other professions.

Overview of the Updated Body of Knowledge

This edition has **four overarching domains** - **Foundational**, **Laboratory Principles**, **Technical**, and **Professional** (see Table 1). Some topics fall under multiple domains and the relevance of each is focused on the subject of the particular domain.

The skills and knowledge within the **Foundational** and **Laboratory Principles** domains are typically acquired through **undergraduate education**, which generally includes **didactic coursework and clinical rotations**. Depending on the type of laboratory where they work, laboratorians may specialize in a single discipline or work across multiple disciplines. The **Technical** and **Professional** domains emphasize the ability to **apply** laboratory skills and techniques to a variety of laboratory settings while remaining actively engaged in **continuous professional development**.

It is important to restate that this document does not cover the knowledge required to complete an undergraduate program of study in medical laboratory science. Those requirements are outlined in the Entry Level Curriculum (ELC) document prepared by ASCLS.¹

Intended Audience

The Body of Knowledge (BOK) serves as a resource for non-medical laboratory professionals—including clinicians, nurses, pharmacists, therapists, patients, caregivers, interprofessional teams, public health officials, and policymakers—to better understand the role of medical laboratory professionals in healthcare. The BOK should also be used by medical laboratory leaders, human resource managers, government agency officials, and workforce development personnel, providing succinct information for those involved in hiring, consultation, regulatory compliance, and related activities.

Foundational Domain

Foundational as used here is defined as the "basis upon which something stands or is supported". This outlines the base knowledge that is necessary for a person to succeed as a medical laboratory professional. Laboratory professionals will gain this information in college or university courses, as well as learned through life experiences.

Mathematics

- Mathematics is the study of numbers, how they relate to one another, and their application to the real world.
 - Medical laboratory professionals must have a comprehensive understanding of mathematical principles, such as ratios, dilutions, algebraic equations, and statistical analysis.

Natural Sciences

- The natural sciences include the study of the natural or physical world. These studies are performed through observation and/or experimentation.
 - Medical laboratory professionals must have knowledge in several of the natural sciences as medical laboratory science is based in the natural sciences. Education for medical laboratory professionals should include biology, molecular biology, anatomy and physiology, chemistry, microbiology, and biochemistry.

Social Sciences

- Social sciences studies individual behaviors and social relationships and how their interactions affect communities and how they relate to society as a whole.
 - Medical laboratory professionals must have knowledge in several of the social sciences as many of the social science disciplines impact the laboratory profession. Psychology and sociology help laboratorians better understand human interactions that can be applied to fellow medical professionals or with patients. Economics and political science have a strong influence on the operations and functionality of the clinical laboratory.
 - Medical laboratory professionals must be able to relate to people, have capacity for calm and reasoned judgement and demonstrate commitment to the patient, as well as serve as a resource for explanation of laboratory services to members of the health care team, external relations, customer service and patient education.² Communication is of the utmost importance for many reasons. This could include but is not limited to: making sure that the laboratory has everything that it needs to function, other healthcare professionals understand what is happening in

- the laboratory and the laboratory results generated by laboratorians, and that legislators understand the importance of and the needs of the clinical laboratory in the healthcare setting.
- Medical laboratory professionals integrate knowledge of interprofessional teams, societal expectations, community interests, public health initiatives, population studies, public policy, and health care law to communicate the essential role of laboratory services in patientcentered care and to more effectively advocate for the clinical laboratory science profession.

Humanities

- The humanities also study human behavior, but typically from the cultural perspective, including the artistic and philosophical lenses combined with more abstract thinking and idea exploration.
 - Medical laboratory professionals must have knowledge in several of the humanities as many of these disciplines will impact the laboratory profession. Literature and history aid laboratorians to know what has worked well and what mistakes to avoid in the future. Philosophy and ethics are very important for laboratorians to make sure that the laboratory professional is doing what is right for the patient with every decision made.

Laboratory Principles Domain

This domain encompasses the basic skills and knowledge needed to be an entry-level laboratorian. The depth of skill and knowledge is what differentiates a medical laboratory technician (MLT) from a medical laboratory scientist (MLS). For more detailed information please see the ASCLS Entry Level Curriculum.

Fields of Practice

 Laboratory medicine encompasses a variety of disciplines. It is expected that the laboratorian knows and understands the didactic/theoretical information associated with the disciplines in which they practice. Medical laboratory professionals understand the theory associated with but not limited to: hematology, hemostasis (coagulation), immunology, immunohematology (blood banking/transfusion medicine), immunology, urinalysis, body fluids, microbiology (bacteriology, virology, parasitology, mycology), molecular biology, and clinical chemistry.

Clinical Laboratory Skills

- There are common skills and laboratory practices that a medical laboratory professional is expected to possess.
 - Medical laboratory professionals are competent in discipline-specific analytical techniques and instrumentation utilized in laboratory testing.
 - Medical laboratory professionals are competent with manual techniques used in laboratory testing, including but not limited to microscopy and pipetting.
 - Medical laboratory professionals are expected to instruct medical and research laboratory trainees and other health care professionals in the principles, interpretation, and performance of tests that are part of their practice.
- Medical laboratory professionals are proactive in promoting a culture of safety for patients and employees.
 - Medical laboratory professionals ensure proper functioning of analytical instruments and other equipment for accurate and precise patient results.
 - Medical laboratory professionals monitor staff competency across the continuum of care for tasks in the total testing process such as specimen collection and processing, routine laboratory testing, reporting, and blood transfusion.
 - Medical laboratory professionals employ safety practices to prevent exposure of patients and the public against laboratory materials with hazardous potential, such as bloodborne pathogens.
 - Medical laboratory professionals follow federal and state standards for employee safety to prevent exposure to toxic chemicals, physical hazards, and infectious diseases.

Comprehensive Skills & Reasoning

- Critical thinking and troubleshooting of instrumentation, specimen integrity, and test selection are common occurrences in the clinical laboratory that a medical laboratory professional is expected to perform.
 - Medical laboratory professionals routinely troubleshoot total testing processes such as quality control, specimen inconsistencies, and correlation of test results with patient's clinical condition, as well as operation and maintenance of highly sophisticated instruments.
 - Medical laboratory professionals assist the healthcare team in applying the laboratory results to the patient's care plan.

Technical Domain

Technical as used here is an adjective that has "special and usually practical knowledge especially of a mechanical or scientific subject" or that is a "characteristic of specialization". This domain encompasses discussion of processes, procedures, analytical and technological methods used in the operation and management of high-quality CLIA-certified medical laboratories.

Laboratory Disciplines

- The field of laboratory medicine encompasses a variety of disciplines, including but not limited to hematology, hemostasis (coagulation), immunology, immunohematology (blood banking/transfusion medicine), immunology, urinalysis, body fluids, microbiology (bacteriology, virology, parasitology, mycology), molecular biology, and clinical chemistry.
 - Medical laboratory professionals may specialize into one or more of a particular discipline-specific area of the generalized field.
- Laboratory testing, troubleshooting, and innovation draw on ideas, knowledge, concepts, and principles from across the field and beyond.

Technology & Data Analytics

- The field of laboratory medicine utilizes current instrumentation, methodologies, and external software applications to generate and analyze clinical data to support medical decision-making process.
 - Laboratory Information Management
 - Medical laboratory professionals collect and use data to monitor for quality assurance.
 - Medical laboratory professionals utilize the systems as a data repository to archive raw data, generate reports, and maintain documentation.

Operational Efficiency

- Operational efficiency focuses on optimizing the processes and resources within a laboratory environment to ensure productivity, quality, and cost effectiveness.
 - Asset utilization & cost efficiency
 - Medical laboratory professionals coordinate and assess the clinical testing process, including the pre-examination, examination, and the post-examination phases.
 - Medical laboratory professionals evaluate, design, and implement new clinical laboratory testing, technology, and methods.
 - Medical laboratory professionals identify areas for improvement, including innovative practice modalities to enhance efficiency and productivity.
 - Quality Management Systems²
 - Medical laboratory professionals develop and implement quality management systems, including quality control and assurance,

competency assessment of personnel, integrating within the health care team, and utilizing continuous process improvement.²

Innovation

- Medical laboratory professionals are well equipped to participate in research and development initiatives.
 - Medical laboratory professionals assess current testing or develop technologies leading to new approaches for diagnosis and clinical management of patients.

Regulatory & Compliance

 The medical laboratory professional must adhere to the wide variety of legal and regulatory responsibilities that govern laboratory environment at both the federal and state level. When applicable, voluntary accreditation agency standards must also be followed.³

Professional Domain

Professional is a word that is frequently used as an adjective or a noun, but may also be used as an adverb. Professional as an adjective means "characterized by or conforming to the technical or ethical standards of a profession" or "exhibiting a courteous, conscientious, and generally businesslike manner in the workplace". Professional as a noun is used to describe "one that is professional". 1

Professional Identity

 A professional identity develops when an individual has internalized the core knowledge, skills, norms, and values of the profession. This results in an individual that feels like a member of the medical laboratory professional community. This includes shaping how a medical laboratory professional conducts themselves, helping to build motivation and confidence, setting career goals, and increasing job satisfaction. Clear and consistent messaging about who medical laboratory professionals are and what it is that they do helps to form this identity.²

- Professional Organizations
 - Medical laboratory professionals build their professional identity by gaining community and networking in professional organizations, like ASCLS or other specialized organizations.
 - Being active in professional organizations allows the medical laboratory professional to grow and develop skills they may not otherwise have the opportunity.
 - The benefit of participation in a society is working together with fellow medical laboratory professionals towards the promotion and worldwide advocacy of the profession.
 - Professional organizations encourage medical laboratory professionals to publish, present, and share their knowledge and research with other professionals. It allows for learning and dissemination of evolving concepts and technologies.
- Education & Training
 - The education and training for medical laboratory professionals are designed to impart comprehensive knowledge, advanced skills, and ethical principles essential for their roles. This contributes to the broader healthcare landscape with a commitment to quality and patient well-being which directly correlates to the medical laboratory professional's identity.
- National Certification
 - Certification of laboratory professionals by professional organizations or credentialing agencies attests that individuals have met standards and obtained core knowledge in diagnostic testing of human samples. Specialized certifications are available for individuals that meet standards and demonstrate expertise in their specialty area(s) of laboratory medicine.
- Licensure
 - ASCLS views licensure of medical laboratory professionals as essential to ensure that patients receive the highest quality laboratory services. (Please see the ASCLS Laboratory Personnel Licensure position paper for more information https://ascls.org/laboratory-personnel-licensure/)³

- Continuing Professional Development
 - Continuing professional development (CPD) is the "intentional maintenance and development of knowledge and skills needed to perform in a professional

context."⁴ CPD refers to either the development of new skills, sharpening or expanding upon current skills.

- Lifelong learning
 - Medical laboratory professionals must stay current with technology and advancements in the field to ensure that patients are receiving the best care with the most up-to-date laboratory tests.
 - Licensure and certification agencies, as well as employers, may require a set number of hours of professional development in order to maintain proficiency.
- Patient-Centered Care & Safety
 - Patient-centered care puts the focus on each individual patient and their needs.
 An integrated, collaborative, and coordinated approach is taken to patient care.
 It empowers the individual to have open communication with their caregivers and to voice their concerns, goals, and preferences.⁵
 - Safe operational practices & reduction of diagnostic errors
 - The patient is the focus of the medical laboratory professional's practice and utilizing evidence-based laboratory practices provides the most effective healthcare available.
 - Efficient and timely laboratory services are provided by medical laboratory professionals.
 - Quality improvement and continuous process improvement principles are applied to laboratory services to reduce opportunities for errors to improve patient outcomes. This includes the use of informatics, information systems, electronic health record systems, and advanced technology for laboratory testing.
 - Medical laboratory professionals bring their laboratory testing expertise to interprofessional teams to help provide optimal standards of care.

 - Interprofessional teams & integrated medicine
 - Medical laboratory professionals communicate with patients, the public, the healthcare team, legislative, regulatory, and industry partners.
 - Medical laboratory professionals collaborate with the healthcare team by employing their expertise to promote appropriate laboratory and diagnostic utilization.
 - Medical laboratory professionals join the patient's direct caregivers in a team to help provide the best care possible by

- providing medical decision support through the use of laboratory data.
- Medical laboratory professionals foster collaborative relationships with other members of the healthcare team (physicians, nurses, pharmacists, etc.) to maintain the lines of communication.

- Medical laboratory professionals maintain a commitment to quality and patient well-being that extends to involvement in routine and novel screening as sentinel laboratories for public health tracking to include global health surveillance.
- Advocacy for access to healthcare
 - Patients have the right to equitable laboratory services that do not vary in quality due to various patient characteristics including gender, ethnicity, geographic location, socioeconomic status.
 - Patients have the right to unfettered access to their own medical information. They also have the right to the clinical knowledge from the patient care team that helps them understand what this medical information means. Certified medical laboratory professionals have the means to aid the patient care team in understanding the purpose of laboratory tests as well as the general interpretation of laboratory results. PROPOSED BYLAWS AMENDMENTS

The ASCLS Board of Directors is recommending the following changes to the ASCLS Bylaws.

Words with strikethroughs are deletions. Words that are underlined are additions.

Amendment 1: Amend the voting process for candidates for National elective positions to allow voting by all eligible members of ASCLS.

Rationale: Currently, voting for national candidates is accomplished by representative delegates to the ASCLS House of Delegates (HOD) at the Annual Meeting. Delegates to the HOD are elected/selected by their constituent Society and elections are held at the annual meeting prior to the opening of the House of Delegates. This amendment would open voting directly to all eligible members of ASCLS (eligible members consist of all members of ASCLS except for Community and Honorary members). Reasons for this change are:

- Transparency opening voting of candidates to all members would provide more transparency to the members.
- Enfranchisement this would increase the engagement of all members and make members feel they are a larger part of ASCLS by having a say in the election of ASCLS leaders All members have a Vote.
- Involvement this could inspire members to become more involved. If they are included in voting, they might take a more active interest in the candidates and being part of ASCLS and even run for office or become a more active participant at all levels.
- Flexibility amending the process would allow more flexibility in the JAM scheduling if voting takes place prior to meeting at JAM, candidate presentations would be done prior to JAM similar to the process used in 2024. This could change the focus on opening days and allow more flexibility in the overall meeting schedule.
- NOTE: The proposed change only applies to voting for the candidates; this does not change the structure of the House of Delegates. The HOD still has the same authority and function, this just opens the voting of candidates to all eligible members.

ARTICLE III — MEMBERSHIP

C. Rights and Privileges

Developing Professional members are entitled to serve as voting members of the House of Delegates when serving as official delegates from a constituent society, vote and to have all other rights and privileges of the Society with the exception of holding elective positions as otherwise defined in the Bylaws.

ARTICLE IV -- BOARD OF DIRECTORS

B. Composition

The number of voting directors shall be sixteen (16) -- the President, President-elect, Secretary/Treasurer, Past President, and ten (10) Directors elected by the House of Delegates eligible members in a manner prescribed by the Board of Directors of the Society. There shall be one (1) voting Developing Professional Director elected by the Developing Professional Forum of the Society and one (1) Ascending Professional Director elected by the Ascending Professional Forum of the Society.

A board member may be eligible for re-election, except the Ascending Professional Director, but may not serve more than two (2) consecutive terms. The House of Delegates Eligible members shall elect by majority vote the appropriate number of directors each year. at its annual session.

G. Vacancies

Any vacancy occurring on the Board of Directors may be filled by vote of the Board of Directors at any regular or special meeting, the new director to serve until the House of Delegates elects a successor at its next annual session a successor is elected prior to the next annual meeting.

ARTICLE V -- HOUSE OF DELEGATES

A. Authority

There shall be a House of Delegates of the Society, which shall have authority within the Society regarding election of the officers and members of the Board of Directors and of elective committees; adoption and amendment of the Bylaws and the Articles of Incorporation according to the laws of the state of incorporation; approval of professional practice standards and scope and direction for the Society and the profession; hearing appeals and rendering final decisions; and to review the annual audit; except as otherwise provided in these Bylaws.

B. Meetings

An annual session of the House of Delegates shall be held at such time and place as the Board of Directors may determine for the purpose of electing officers, directors and elected members of the Nominations Committee and the Judicial Committee, and for the transaction of such other transacting business as may come under the authority of the House of Delegates, as specified under Section A of this Article.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS

B. Election of Officers

The House of Delegates, at its annual session, Prior to the annual meeting, eligible members shall elect by a majority vote of the votes cast a President-elect annually and a Secretary/Treasurer triennially.

Vacancies in these offices may be filled at any meeting of the Board of Directors, except that in the event of a vacancy in the office of the President, the President-elect shall become President for the remainder of that term and for the succeeding year. In the event of a vacancy in the office of President-elect, at the next prior to the annual meeting of the House of Delegates, both a President-elect and President shall be elected by a vote of eligible members.

ARTICLE VII – COMMITTEES

A. Nominations Committee There shall be a Nominations Committee of the House of Delegates, consisting of not more than ten (10) members, who shall be elected by the House of Delegates a vote of the eligible members.

The Nominations Committee shall be responsible for presenting to the House of Delegates at its succeeding annual session to the membership, nominations for those positions to be filled by election prior to the annual meeting.

B. Judicial Committee

There shall be a Judicial Committee of the Society, consisting of five (5) members elected by majority vote of the House of Delegates eligible members.

Amendment 2: Replacing the requirement for Majority vote for Directors and Elective Committee members with Plurality vote.

Rationale:

- When the Society amended the makeup of the ASCLS Board of Directors to include Directors-at-Large rather than Region Directors, this resulted in more candidates running for a set number of openings.
- When the Directors were selected from specific regions, there were rarely more than 2 individuals competing for each regional open seat.
- As was seen in the 2024 election, we had 9 candidates running for 5 open seats.
- With the current requirement set at a 'win' being a majority of the vote as defined by >50% of the vote, this resulted in multiple runoff ballots.
- Changing the requirement from majority to plurality (most votes wins the seat), the chances of runoff ballots are greatly reduced.

A **majority voting system** is an electoral system in which the winner of an election is the candidate that received more than half (50%) of the votes cast.

A **plurality voting system** is an electoral system in which the winner of an election is the candidate that received the highest number of votes. The candidate need not win an outright majority to be elected.

Replace 'majority' with 'plurality' in the following Articles: Article IV.B and Article VII.B

*Proviso: If Amendment #1 passes, then the wording in Amendment #2 referring to the House of Delegates will be corrected by the ASCLS Bylaws Committee to reflect the new wording in Amendment #1.

Other Activities/Strategic Decisions

Presidential Letters: Sent letters relative to ASCLS Concerns in consultation with the EVP to government officials and other organizations in support of the ASCLS Mission and Vision!

Services and Budgetary Items: Just as the president is responsible for the letters as described above, as a fiduciary of the organization, I was responsible for making decisions such as removing some of the food and beverage expenditures for the BOD for this years annual meeting to reduce costs. In addition, when the BOD agreed to offer "Crowded" for the constituent societies, there were insufficient groups to meet the cost. I authorized the platform, knowing this, and we were able to secure sufficient society numbers to offset this cost. This is just a small fraction of what can and does occur throughout the association year that the membership entrusts upon the president in order to move the organization forward and remain relevant to support the membership and the profession.

Provided updates in the open forum on critical issues and concerns, on an as needed basis. Worked at transparency, but did not want to overwhelm and flood the forum. Utilized both the open forum, and let's talk venues to provide information in between regular board meetings and governance events.

Accomplishments

Implemented an annual board assessment using ASAE materials. And provided to the ASCLS Board of Directors for review and planning.

Clinical Laboratory Science Journal- Completed the updating of all the articles stuck in the queue since loosing the editorial staff. Secured a full new editorial staff including EIC, and 4 associate editors. Journal still under revision, but it is active and I am happy to say they are receiving and processing articles on a regular basis.

Consumer Information Response Team- Under the advisement of Dr. Susan LeClair to expand the reach of the Consumer information response team, instituted a sound collaboration with Diverse Health Hub to create a new platform and partnership to ensure the legacy of the CIRT would continue. The current software program that was being utilized was no longer viable, and had this not been implemented, the critical function and opportunity for volunteers to impact patient care, would have been lost. This collaboration will only continue to grow, as there are plans for additional opportunities to showcase laboratory professionals. As the past-president, I will continue to work with DHH to move this action forward.

Awards Committee: The awards committee did the work, and really developed the full ideas to implement. I simply re-established the committee as a volunteer committee. The committee the past year, was not functional and all awards were managed by the staff. This committee was never removed and remained a volunteer committee. As a result, they have established new awards and expanded some to coincide with the ASCLS Strategic pillars that includes the APF and DPF awards, Community Engagement Award, and revision of Omicron Sigma processing and the Life Time Achievement Award to the Pinnacle award along with the

Rodak Showcase of the past recipients. More to come, as they continue award updates into the next year.

Association of Medical Laboratory Education Programs(AMLEP)- I had the honor and privilege to appoint the first AMLEP Board of Directors and work alongside them to complete their incorporation, creation of their bylaws and then continue to serve as the Board Liaison as they developed their focus, taskforces, membership categories and strategic initiatives. I will have the privilege to continue this work in the upcoming year as past-president.

CoAG Scholarships- This was an important endeavor on behalf of the ASCLS Staff and EVP, Jim Flanigan. Although I did not do the work, I felt it is important to acknowledge this work by the ASCLS Staff to complete the work on the CoAG agreement with CDC. The full work associated with the cooperative agreement will be completed this August, but it was through their work together that we were able to launch the scholarship applications at CLEC and award multiple scholarships to educators and students!

Entry Level Curriculum- Finishing up the year, something that has been on the radar is the appointment of members to revise and update the ELC. This was created in 2016 and needs some review. Additional appointments may be required after the annual meeting to insure all areas have sufficient volunteers and disciplines represented.

Policy and Procedures

<u>Long Range Planning</u>- Began this work as president elect, to update this committee to Strategic Planning and Execution Committee (SPEC). Utilized the expertise of this group not only for planning day, but to review and update committee charges. New policy implemented and continued with PE-Riding.

<u>Annual Meeting Steering Committee and Abstract Review Committee</u>; Led the process and combined the two and updated the policy and procedure. This improved the ability of the abstract review committee to have substantial more support and collaboration with the annual meeting steering committee. Improved operations and efficiencies.

<u>Patient Safety and Choosing Wisely</u>-Led the update and combined choosing wisely with patient safety to retain this critical activity that the members are passionate about, when choosing wisely was no longer being supported. Created the The Patient Safety and Diagnostic Stewardship Committee.

<u>DCLS Oversight Committee</u>; Worked with this group to update their policy and procedure, committee description. It is now the DCLS Advancement Committee. This reinforces their new focus on advancing the role and visibility of the DCLS, from oversight, which was for the development of the degree. Aligned the new policy with the need and practice of the committee.

<u>Elections Taskforce:</u> Appointed this critical taskforce to create a standardized SOP for elections, and credentials to improve efficiency and eliminate confusion during elections. This will assist not only the candidates but the members/delegates in the process of voting and attending the house of delegates. Two new policies were created and approved by the Board of Directors. This group did a tremendous amount of work in a very short time and I commend them for their efforts and results!

Regional Taskforce: Created the regional taskforce to evaluate the regions and provide data on the functions and challenges among the regions. Gather information regarding the current activities and structure of the Regions' including their leadership structure. Review the current makeup of the Regions and determine a uniform structure and leadership among all Regions. This is an on-going project that will continue into PE-Ridings term.

Systems:

- Operations: On October 1, 2024, ASCLS formally completed its long-time relationship with NeoSystems and now functions fully independently for operations. New systems for accounting, accounts payable, and payroll are all functioning well. As a reminder, the Society is now getting its mail at P.O. Box 92, Dundee, MI 48131. The general phone number is now 301-478-6379. The change from NeoSystems reduces our practical FTEs by approximately ³/₄ FTE. Some of that work will be taken on by existing staff, but we will need to dramatically scale up our operational efficiency. This change is anticipated to save approximately \$80,0000 in FY2025 compared to FY2024, and nearly \$100,000 in FY2026 compared to FY2024.
- CDC Cooperative Agreement (CoAg): Part of our ongoing Cooperative Agreement with the CDC that concludes August 31, 2025, we have begun issuing need-based scholarship in two areas.
 - Faculty Development Scholarships for educators currently employed as a nontenured medical laboratory educators, enrolled as a student and working toward a degree that would enhance the student educator's prospects toward advancement (typically this is a masters or doctoral degree); and
 - Career Ladder Scholarships for those currently employed as a certified medical laboratory professional and enrolled as a student in a course of study intended to lead to additional medical laboratory certifications.

ASCLS received 221 applications for what will likely be between 40-60 scholarships. Total distribution will be \$200,000. A first set of 12 Faculty Development Scholarships has been issued totaling approximately \$56,000. The first 22 Carer Ladder Scholarships will be issued in June totaling approximately \$53,000. The balance of the available funds will be awarded to current applicants no later than the end of July.

Another component of the Cooperative Agreement is Content Development, later this summer, ASCLS will launch a free, P.A.C.E.-accredited course on Labucate focused on improving culture within clinical laboratories and increasing retention of professionals in the field. The modules will be:

- Well-Being at the Bench: Cultivating Wellness in the Medical Laboratory Environment, Tywauna Wilson
- Operations: On October 1, ASCLS formally completed its long-time relationship with NeoSystems and now functions fully independently for operations. New systems for accounting, accounts payable, and payroll are all functioning well.
- Social Media Boosts: ASCLS has begun the second year of boosting advertising
 for our constituent society spring meeting to a broad audience of addressable nonmembers. The goal is to support our constituent societies as they seek to recruit
 using their meetings.
- ELMC2: After a small dip in 2024, the 2025 Emerging Laboratory Managers
 Collaborative Conference (ELMC2) set new attendance and revenue records.
 Bottom line for the program is expected to exceed the budgeted net. With the
 calendar for 2026 very tight with CLEC earlier in the year, the dates from ELMC2
 have been moved to before the holidays to November 14-15, 2025. ELMC2 will be
 a fall conference moving forward.
- CLEC: The 2025 Clinical Laboratory Educators Conference (CLEC) in Atlanta recently concluded with 680 registrants, which is close behind last year's record of 728, making CLEC 2025 our second largest CLEC.

Strategy:

- Workforce: We continue to work with Congresswoman Deborah Ross (NC-02) to find Republican co-sponsors for the laboratory workforce bill. Other professional and trade groups within the clinical laboratory community are putting effort into finding cosponsors. As currently drafted, the bill would make medical laboratory professionals part of the National Health Services Corps, which would put the profession on the list of those HRSA tracks for shortages and make the professional eligible for loan forgiveness under the program. The Act would also create a small-scale grant program to support innovative approaches to teaching with a focus on training individuals from rural, underrepresented, or disadvantaged backgrounds. To gain agreement for co-sponsors, the bill may undergo some changes. ASCLS PAC held a fundraising lunch for Rep. Ross in April.
- Reimbursement Legislation: A one-year delay in the implementation of PAMA runs out
 in January 2026. With a large budget reconciliation bill currently in the Senate, the the
 environment for passage of a permanent solution finds a challenging environment.
 ACLA is leading efforts to work with the Senate to draft language that would address,
 at least in part, the deeply concerning cuts to the Clinical Laboratory Fee Schedule
 (CLFS) in January. A permanent solution to PAMA would be a net cost to the federal
 government.
- Regulation of Laboratory Developed Tests: Lawsuits challenging the FDA's rules on the regulation of Laboratory Developed Tests were granted summary judgement. Recently, the FDA indicated it had no intention of appealing the ruling. Changes now would require legislative action, which would likely coincide with reauthorization of the user fee legislation for medical devices that would likely occur in the next Congress.
- CLIAC: Last month, without any official announcement, the Clinical Laboratory
 Improvement Advisory Committee (CLIAC) was disbanded at the direction of the
 Secretary of Health and Human Services. There appears to be unanimous concern
 about this development within the clinical laboratory community. APHL is leading a
 sign on letter urging the Secretary to reinstate the committee. ASCLS is determining
 whether additional grass roots efforts may have an impact.
- Joint Annual Meeting: The decision by the Department of Defense earlier this year to restrict travel of those in the military to "mission critical" instead of "mission essential" forces our partners at SAFMLS to cancel their planned activities including hosting "Readiness Days." This has had a material impact on revenue, primarily via registrations. Some reduction in industry presence has occurred, but an increase and restructuring of industry packages was able to mitigate some loss. With meeting revenue down, efforts have been made to capture cost savings wherever possible, which includes the elimination of breakfasts, which were introduced in 2022 at the request of SAFMLS. They previously had been sponsored, but no sponsor agreed to fund them this year.
- Membership: The data below show comparisons of membership levels and year-over-year growth or decline by membership class. In December 2024 we were at -39
 Ascending Professionals and -156 Professionals. (+59 Developing Professionals),
 which indicates a substantial improvement over the Spring meeting season for our

constituent groups. Overall, 17 CS increased their non-developing professional membership last year and three others maintained their membership numbers. This is a substantial increase from the previous year. Three groups saw their retention rate meet or exceed 90%.

The Ascending Professionals Forum (APF) continues to grow and thrive, serving as a dynamic incubator for current and future leaders of ASCLS. This year, the Forum proudly hosted the 10th Annual Lab Week Run (LWR), featuring a commemorative medal designed by the dedicated LWR Subcommittee. The event was a resounding success, with approximately 1,459 medals sold and nearly \$50,000 in gross sales. Proceeds from the Lab Week Run enabled the APF to award over \$20,000 in scholarships to support Ascending Professionals attending all national ASCLS conferences, including: Labvocate, ELMC², CLEC, and LabJAM 2025.

Beyond scholarships, the Forum organized two major "Ask Me Anything" (AMA) events—one held virtually in the fall and a live session planned for JAM 2025 in Sacramento. The APF also hosted its second annual JAM t-shirt fundraiser online and coordinated the annual APF social event, fostering connection and community among members. We would like to extend our sincere thanks to the American Society for Clinical Laboratory Science, one of our two sponsoring organizations, for their continued support of laboratory accreditation and education.

The NAACLS Annual Report highlights the contributions of NAACLS Board of Directors, Review Committee members, self-study reviewers, and site visitors-- including first-time volunteers and mentors. It also features NAACLS News articles, 2024 workshops, and data to include "NAACLS Programs by State," "BOD Actions – Accredited Programs," and our "Statements of Financial Position."

In early 2025, NAACLS Staff launched a multi-part content series focused on program advocacy. Using the June 2023 President's Report, Educational Programs: Threats and Opportunities as a model (authored by Maribeth Flaws), the goal was to create a thought-provoking resource for the community. Program advocacy was chosen in response to ongoing discussions about including a student-to-faculty ratio in the Standards. The rationale behind this proposed ratio is to provide programs with a tool to advocate for increased institutional support.

Recognizing the board's concerns about the broader implications of a mandated ratio, NAACLS staff approached the topic from a different perspective. What began as a single article evolved into a seven-part series, including five articles published in the NAACLS News, authored by current and former board members, volunteers, and a new program director. The series concluded with a Dr. NAACLS roundtable, featuring many of the contributing authors. In response to the College of American Pathologists (CAP) decision to exclude the Doctor of Clinical Laboratory Science (DCLS) from eligibility as a High-Complexity Laboratory Director (HCLD), the NAACLS Doctoral Review Committee (DRC) drafted a letter to CAP's President and Executive Director requesting reconsideration of this policy in February. CAP replied with a willingness to engage in further dialogue. The DRC will coordinate a formal response during its summer meeting.

NAACLS had a strong presence at the 2025 Clinical Laboratory Educators Conference (CLEC) located in Atlanta, Georgia in March, where we hosted a pre-conference workshop, an exhibitor booth, and Q&A sessions.

The NAACLS Board of Directors met virtually April 24-25, 2025. Highlights include:

- •The BOD accepted 41 accreditation award recommendations from our review committees.
- •Currently, Susie Norris Zanto serves as the Secretary and Maribeth Flaws serves as the Past President for the BOD. Christie Massen and Maribeth Flaws are both departing

members at the Fall 2025 Board Meeting. NAACLS welcomes Brooke Solberg and Jed Doxtater as the ASCLS Representatives for the Board of Directors.

- •The 2024 Standards were adopted in September of 2024, and all related documents are currently being revised with the new Standards and the rebranding guidelines. The first self-studies under the new standards will be submitted in October 2025.
- •The Future and Emerging Professions Task Force continues to explore new accreditation pathways for NAACLS to pursue. A pathway for the Medical Lab Blood Bank Scientist was approved in April 2025, with a public comment period forthcoming. This is an entry-level role and should not be confused with the Blood Bank Specialist accredited by CAAHEP. As NAACLS expands its reach internationally, the International Program Accreditation Task Force has been developing policies and procedures to guide the non-USA accreditation process. These efforts coincide with the influx of inquiries from non-USA programs. In response to the growing number of data requests, the Board will establish a Data Governance Task Force to oversee and manage data-related policies and practices.

Highlighted Activities since last HOD meeting in June of 2024.

- The next meeting of the BOC Board of Governors (BOG) meeting will be Thursday, November 20 Saturday, November 22, 2025 in Atlanta, GA. ASCLS Representatives to the BOG are Dana Duzan. Joan Polancic. Michelle Preston, and Kim Von Ahsen.
- The ASCP BOC is implementing digital badging (by Credly) and plans to go-live in January 2026. Digital badges will be provided for examinees who successfully pass and examination/earn a credential and also as evidence of the ASCP BOC's Credential Maintenace Program (CMP). Digital badges are intended to drive down fraud associated with hard copy certificates. Additional details will be forthcoming.
- 30 Day Retakes: An applicant to a BOC examination may now schedule a retake exam as early as 30 days after the date of an unsuccessful examination attempt. This is in place of the 90-day waiting period for qualifications and a 60-day waiting period for certification.
- Military Recognition: The Air Force, Army, and Navy now require the MLS(ASCP) credential for commissioned officers serving in each service's laboratory manager or director designated career. This is a great step forward in the military for personnel requirements.
- The BOC Exam Committees and Work Groups are currently accepting volunteer applications for the 2026 meetings. https://www.ascp.org/content/board-of-certification/about-boc/#volunteer
- The spring BOC Newsletter was published in March. https://ascpcdn.s3.us-east-

- The ASCP BOC is working on a new website that should go live in the fall of 2025.
- The BOC has established a DCLS Examination Committee as plans continue to offer certification in the future.
